
Viking Day in JBB

One child brought an entire rug to school and wore it as a shawl. There were epic accessories too: some were shop-bought and some were made at home (They were the best ones.)



The first activity of the morning consisted of designing ferocious shields, followed by a table top gallery where the children selected their favourite piece. Shannessa (aged 10) said, "It was very interesting as we got to see all of the new designs."





After their break, the children participated in a historical lesson about Viking longhouses. Each child presented a longhouse interior, which they had designed. Luckily, they had help from their resident artist, Sebby, who modelled an eye-catching design on the Interactive Whiteboard.


In the afternoon, the children went outside to take part in some sculpting of 3 frames. This process was called Wattle and Daub and children were taught by Mr Coad, who is an amazing local builder who also knew lots about ancient building techniques. First the children hammered in some wooden poles (wattles), then they wove some slim planks in between before finishing by splattering them with mud and straw mix (daub). The year 6's carved their names while the year 5's imprinted their hands in the finished product. "The new experience really made year sixes last weeks at school special and it's a memory I think we will all remember forever," explained Eden (Year 6). It certainly put a smile on everyone's faces at the end of the day.


Safeguarding/Health and Safety/Wellbeing Update Parking
