Music Festival



On Thursday 26th May Green Club members and Mrs Cort took over Mr Kear's office and participated in a Spirit FM pre-recorded radio interview with News Reporter Simon Fielding. They explained how, with the help of parents, staff and the general public the school might be able to win £500 towards the school building project by competing in the Febreeze Freshness Rewards Contest. The contest is part of a recycling fundraising initiative called the Febreeze Air and Home Care Recycling Programme, which enables any brand of air freshener and home care products and packaging to be recycled for the first time (see below).

Please collect any brand of plastic air fresheners and the packaging they come in, trigger heads and flip caps from the likes of bathroom and kitchen cleaner and washing up liquid and flexible plastic cleaning wipes packs. Put them in the bin in the school playground and we could be in with a chance of winning £500! Otherwise these items will needlessly go to landfill wasting resources instead of being recycled into new items. The recycling bins in the playground are for the public during school hours, so do encourage your community and other family members to collect too.
